#### Programme

The event will be divided in 3 moments:

- 1. Short presentation of the idea and concept and of partners that are already on board
- 2. Interactive discussion on the content of the debate. Which questions are critical to ask to citizens? What do stakeholders want to know from the citizens of the world? What are the topics to come and the topics for which the informed view of the citizens of the world will make a difference?
- 3. Discussion on the partnership and the coalition that will launch and implement the debate: Statements from interested stakeholders, discussion on the timeline and organisation.

#### Why launching a Global Citizens' Debate on the future of Internet?

The global discussion on the Internet and Digitalization of Society has reached a certain inertia after a decade of decision-shaping forums and events (WSIS, IGFs, NetMundial, ...). New issues are emerging that modify the rules and potentially change the routines: Digital literacy, Fake news, propaganda, algorithm regulation, Artificial Intelligence, Blockchain, Online Harassment, ...

In all these debates, there seems to be a paradoxical situation: While it is very difficult to reach out to the public at large, citizens are becoming more and more aware and concerned over massive surveillance, big data exploitation, privacy infringements, robotisation of jobs, ...

Citizens are willing but never put in a position to understand and manage what is happening to their data, to contribute to the vision for the future and to provide their feedback to stakeholders. It is therefore timely and urgent to reach out to ordinary citizens in order to scale-up their voices and perspectives in relation to the global discussions on the future of the Internet.

This is why we want to launch a global debate on the future of Internet that will gather thousands of citizens around the planet. The results of these debates will be smart, unique and highly qualitative.

## Background on the method: It's not a global poll, it's a deliberation between citizens worldwide

Global deliberations are a tool reflecting the new paradigm of a diverse, inclusive, informed, interested and empowered human global society. Based on collective intelligence protocols, supported by political and sociological sciences, they are the best tool for the expression of the citizens of the 21st Century on complex issues. Their fundamental principle is to combine a strong Information input with massive face-to-face and online Deliberation.


A global deliberation engages thousands of ordinary citizens (included illiterate persons) in groups representing the diversity of their country/region who deliberate on the topics at stake, before giving their contribution (answers, questions, visions, collective storytelling) to the global negotiating community and stakeholders. We plan to engage 15.000+ citizens in 150 countries in the f2f events and 100.000+ in the online debate.

The debates will articulate the needs and visions of ordinary citizens. They will provide new and smart insights which will help to shape the decision-making process on the Future of Internet and Digitalization of Society. More specifically, the debates will produce:

- Fact-based and informed opinion of the citizens of the world which will be valid over a long period of time (min 2 to 4 years)
- Aggregated quantitative and qualitative data at global, national and regional levels
- Communication and dissemination contents (information material, interviews of participants, results report, social-media contents, etc.)
- Capacity building for more than 150 organisations worldwide and thousands of citizens"Mirror-

debates" (debate Toolbox available in 50+ languages)

- Strong media presence thanks to critical mass of events and partners involved
- Campaign of awareness raising on the topics of the future of the internet, potentially reaching millions of citizens
